Penny Borenstein, MD Public Health Director, SLO County Health Agency

Dr. Penny Borenstein has a very critical and challenging job as the county public health director. The mission of the Public Health Department is to "promote, preserve and protect the health of all San Luis Obispo County residents through disease surveillance, health education, direct services, and health policy development". Her organization has over 200 employees and a \$30 M budget that administers over 50 diverse programs within the county. Preventative services are a big part of their agenda. As Penny notes, "Genes load the gun, lifestyle pulls the trigger".



According to Dr. Borenstein, the big issues that keep her up at night are emerging or novel infections and concerns over whether we will have antibiotics or other effective treatments available in light of increasing microbe resistance, the health impacts of climate change & drought, and the growing opioid epidemic. The Department's overall goals are to prevent epidemics, advocate healthy behaviors, protect against environmental hazards, respond to

disasters, and promote accessible healthcare. She noted that the SLO County Public Health Laboratory is a Level 3 facility providing clinical and environmental testing to support programs of the Health Agency as well as hospital, clinics, physicians, private businesses, citizens, and local state and federal authorities.

Justin Davis provided the introduction for Penny. She has an undergraduate degree from Cornell, a masters degree in public health from John Hopkins and a medical degree from SUNY Health Sciences Center at Syracuse. She is a board member for United Way of SLO.

One of the questions asked during Q&A was whether her department does well water testing. While testing was previously limited to wells serving four or more users, a new program was recently announced for individual resident wells.
