Loretta Butts Past District 5240 Governor

Loretta Butts may be done with her stint as Rotary District 5240 Governor, but she still has energy for new Rotary projects. Her latest passion is recruiting local Rotary clubs to become "Peacebuilder" clubs. In Rotary Year 2015-16, District 5240 became a Peacebuilder District with then President Jim Bell investing \$50,000 of district funds toward the initiative. In addition to funding, District leadership made a commitment to promote programs and projects aligned with all areas of Rotary focus including Peace, Conflict Prevention and Conflict Resolution. Peace is not just the absence of war, it is the lack of poverty, injustice, and hopelessness.

Loretta is a member of the Atascadero Rotary Club and has been a Rotary member for 22 years. Through her work with Rotary International, she has traveled to Nigeria and Uganda. She is a registered financial advisor and broker employed by LPL Financial of Atascadero. She and her husband John have been residents of the Central Coast for 28 years after moving from the Bay area in 1989. She has 3 grown children and 10 grandchildren.

Loretta's visit to our club was a follow-up to an earlier meeting where she introduced Bianca Neff, a Rotary Peace Fellow, and founding director of Petra Peacebuilders. Bianca demonstrates the value of providing scholarships to graduate students interested in careers in conflict resolution and peacebuilding in challenged communities. Thanks to the work of Rotary International and a growing number of Peacebuilder Rotary clubs, we now have 1000 Peace Fellows like Bianca available to train, convene and empower other followers around the world.

Loretta reminded members that in spite of all the media focus on conflict, we actually live in the most peaceful period in human history. While most of the peacebuilder activity is appropriately aimed at developing countries, the work is also relevant to local concerns such as gang violence. Loretta encouraged our members to consider becoming a peacebuilder club and ended with the challenge "Let's wage peace".
