## Colonel Nicole Balliet

### Commander, Camp Roberts, CA Army National Guard

Colonel Balliet is an excellent local leader as the Commander of Camp Roberts. Camp Roberts is a California National Guard post located just north of Paso Robles now run by the CA *Army* National Guard. Colonel Balliet was assigned to Camp Roberts in August 2015 after serving as the executive officer to the adjutant general in Sacramento for two years. She was promoted to the rank of Colonel this past August.



Colonel Balliet is no newcomer to the area. She was previously Commander of Camp San Luis Obispo, a facility she was assigned to for 17 years. During her time at Camp San Luis Obispo, she served two tours of duty in Iraq.

Nicole grew up in North Dakota where she started her career with the National Guard. She has an undergraduate degree from the University of North Dakota and a masters degree from Gonzaga University. She also attended the Army War College in Carlisle, PA.

Camp Roberts is named after Harold W. Roberts, a World War I Medal of Honor recipient. It was built in 1941 to support troops during World War II. It was constructed in 9 months and deactivated in 1946. However, it was reactivated in 1950 to support the war in Korea. This year, Camp Roberts will celebrate its 75th anniversary.

In her current role as commander of Camp Roberts, Colonel Balliet manages a very unique and diverse set of military facilities located on 43,000 acres. It is adjacent to Fort Hunter Liggett, an Army Reserve facility. The training facilities include firing ranges that accommodates ammo from 9 mm to 155 mm howitzers as well as hand grenades. The Combined Arms Collective Training Facility (CACTF) was built at a cost of \$9 M and simulates a small village. It is used by Army, Marines and law enforcement agencies to train in urban warfare.

Camp Roberts host training for a variety of international allies including, Britain, Ukraine, and Nigeria. It also hosts training and operations for firefighting and other emergency response teams.
