Dale Hiner Paso Robles Treasurer Hunter

Dale Hiner has a real passion for treasure hunting. But Dale and his treasure hunting team do not seek old coins or other valuable artifacts to accumulate personal wealth. They enjoy finding unique items and exploring the history that these objects represent. Everything they collect goes to museums, nothing is sold. In fact, Dale's favorite finds are not the most valuable items in his collection, but are connected to people or events that bring local history alive. Dale's love of history is quite evident as he shares the stories about many of his finds.

Dale *(below)* was introduced by Dennis Cassidy who has a special bond with him that goes back at least 50 years. They both grew up in



the same Paso Robles neighborhood. Dale was a Paso Robles police officer who used to take young Dennis on "ride alongs" in his squad car. Dennis enjoyed the experience so much that he later became a police officer and ultimately police chief for Paso Robles. After Dale retired from law enforcement, he worked as a real estate agent for Century 21. About 14 years ago, Dale got his first metal detector and a third career as

treasure hunter was launched.

Dale brought an impressive array of artifacts that he and his friends have found over the years including many gold and silver coins that are probably the most "valuable" items in the collection. But Dale spent more time talking about the history behind the metal tokens that used to be given out by various local stores as promotional items. Another interesting find was a Kodak camera from a World War I soldier that is so fragile that it needed to be encased in clear plastic. One of the oldest items found was a 2 ½ pound cannonball from a cannon deployed at Mission San Miguel Arcangel.

There are five regulars in Dale's treasure hunting group. They deploy 11 different types of metal detectors and a drone that gives them clues on where to search. They always work with property owners to ensure that there are no disputes over found treasure.
