Monterey Bay Aquarium

Brent Jones has always had a passion for science and technology. Now he gets to fulfill these interests through his work at Monterey Bay Aquarium Research Institute (MBARI). MBARI's mission is to develop innovative technologies for studying and understanding the ocean, using that technology to explore and understand natural ocean systems, and share the knowledge gained, solutions devised, and the technology developed.

Brent (right) was introduced by his father Dan who is justifiably proud of his son's accomplishments. Brent is a Paso Robles native, a member of Boy Scout's Troop 60 and an Eagle Scout. He graduated from UC San Diego with BS and MS degrees in chemical engineering. He was hired by Scripts Institute as an intern and then a full time employee for 17 years. There he gained an appreciation for the needs of ocean researchers for innovative data gathering platforms that can reliably operate in the challenging marine environment.



Brent eventually moved to Monterey with his wife and children as he took a position at MBARI working on a variety of marine vehicles. Brent's specialty are Remotely Operated Vehicles (ROVs) piloted by surface operators and Autonomous Underwater Vehicles (AUV) that can perform programmed missions without continuous human intervention. Vehicle designs are optimized around a variety of diverse mission parameters including duration, depth of operation, sensor requirements, flexibility and speed. ROVs & AUVs are very cost effective and weather independent. MBARI also has an Unmanned Aerial Vehicle (UAV) that provides useful overhead perspectives.

MBARI was founded by HP founder David Packard as an alternative to traditional academic oceanographic research institutions. MBARI is known for its excellent peer relationships among scientists and engineers. MBARI currently has a \$50 M annual budget and 210 employees.
