**Gregg Wangard, Director of Food Services
 Paso Robles School District**

Gregg Wangard is a master chef who is bringing his great culinary experience and enthusiasm to the Paso Robles School District (PRSD). Gregg looks too young to have over twenty years of experience, but he started his professional career cooking at the age of 15. As director of food services for the PRSD, Gregg oversees a variety of programs and activities including the Culinary Arts Academy. The Academy is a unique and multi-faceted facility that hosts both an instructional kitchen and a fully functional dining area. It is also a full production kitchen that produces and supplies sixteen other sites in the Paso Robles School District area. The facility also hosts the Academy Cafe that enables students to work and operate in an actual restaurant providing valuable experience to ease transition into actual employment in area restaurants.

Gregg grew up in a small town in Wisconsin and his fascination with cooking began by assisting his grandmother with holiday feast preparation. Since moving west, he has worked at many of the leading resorts including The American Club, Whistling Straights, Blackwolf Run, Cucina, Caneel Bay, Loews Santa Monica Beach Hotel, Cliff's Resort, and Sycamore Mineral Springs Resort. Going to work for the PRSD was a significant shift that surprised many of his friends and colleagues, but Gregg wanted his children and other students to reap the benefits of the fantastic local food products grown locally in our area. He also wanted to be part of the "One Team-One Dream-District of Excellence" organization that Chris Williams initiated as superintendent.

The PRSD Food Services team now prepares about 2,000 meals a day. Gregg is working on a variety of upgrades including a new deli case with food items prepared by students for sale to the public. They are also installing a new Point of Sale (POS) system that will enable customers to pre-order student prepared meals that will feed a family of four for about \$25-30. The Academy uses the "learn by doing" teaching style that will prepare students for a dynamic career in the culinary field.
