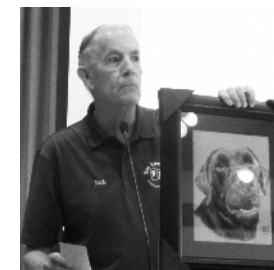
### Jack Gould, Executive Director Son Care Foundation

Jack Gould leads New Life K9s, a non-profit organization that trains service dogs that truly makes a difference in the lives of combat veterans and first responders suffering PTSD, as well as prisoners who serve as dog trainers. Their mission is “saving lives through the healing power of the human-canine bond”. Jack (*right*) began by acknowledging generous donors like club member Jennifer Idler who sponsored the training of the chocolate lab named “Hope” shown in the portrait Jack will give to Jennifer.

Jack showed a video of numerous veterans who told of the remarkable healing power that these service dogs provide to those fortunate enough to receive one. The need is great and the statistics are grim. More than 22 veterans commit suicide each day. One in three combat veterans are diagnosed with PTSD and one in three homeless are veterans.

Jack introduced Greg who brought his service dog “Eddie” who was trained by a murderer in prison. Greg was a crime scene investigator with PTSD who did not respond to various traditional therapies. Greg’s life “did a 180” once he received Eddie who provides Greg with unconditional love. Greg believes Eddie changed his life and the lives of those around him by lowering anxiety, reducing his medication, and allowing him to do regular activities again.

Jack is proud that all dogs trained by New Life K9s utilize a new training method called “bond-based teaching” noting that “love is all you need”. Bond-based training is grounded in providing unconditional love that is particularly effective in rehabilitating inmate trainers. While the majority of prisoners return to crime when released, only 11% of inmate trainers do so. And dogs trained in prison settings may be the safest canines anywhere according to Jack. Another benefit of inmate training is it lowers the high cost of training from \$45-85K per dog to \$10-12K thereby allowing more of those in need to receive a service dog sooner.
